GEMS AT GRACE

A 6:45 pm on the first and third Wednesdays of the month—even during Spring Break-- the church doors are open for GEMS. But before then the counselors and helpers have been busy in the building—turning on the lights, putting out the yard signs that announce the meeting, getting the snack stuff into the church, and setting up the meeting rooms.

When the girls come in—some walking from down the block, some riding with their moms, some picked up by counselors and helpers---all 25-30 of them stream into the downstairs classroom next to the playground. That's where the piano is, and that's where the craft supplies are stored. To Nicole's lively accompaniment they sing some of their favorites including "Step by Step", "I'm So Glad Jesus Lifted Me," and practice this year's memory verses.

By 7:15 all the GEMS have sorted themselves



into their classrooms the saphires (with Melanie Karr and Becca Timmermans) next to the lounge, the rubies (Becky VanDyke, Nicole Lenko)

amethysts(Emily Helder, Jill Hausman, Emily Derks), emeralds, (Brittany Dekker and Manda Hart) and diamonds (Jenny Dekker, Marla Hoekwater, Eileen Kooreman)upstairs—for their Bible lessons. Each class has a team of teachers—sometimes their own mom, sometimes a woman they get to know at church. While they are in class, Barbara and Megan Haviland are getting snack trays ready to bring upstairs, and the craft helpers (Kim Eggebeen, and Merideth Post Treman) are preparing the fellowship hall for craft time. Last week they made friendship bracelets.

By 8:30 the meeting is over. Books are back on classroom shelves, the kitchen is clean, the fellowship hall swept up. Girls carrying finished craft projects are walking or riding home.

Gems leaders plan their lessons all week. They meet their students with love, with discipline, and with attention to each person in their classes. They pray that God's love for each girl will speak to the GEMS through this program. The rest of us can help them by providing them their meeting place, by praying for them and by voicing our encouragement.

House residents are friends to neighborhood children. We continue to recruit excellent Sunday School teachers.

Additional project are recommended: Continue to explore how to create a partnership between church and parents via conversation, mentoring, a handbook, or other means-and report to Council on results. Continue to work with the Worship Committee to involve youth in leadership roles in worship services. Continue to encourage and develop simple, informal ways for adult members to cultivate relationships with youth: learn their names, pray, send birthday cards, show interest.

IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Karl Westerhof continues to serve as Minister of Outreach. Grace House is full with residents; Jason and Erin Carrigan and their son Oliver, Mary Nasca, Nicole Lenko, and Emily Derks. GEMS and Cadet Clubs are revitalized. Believe to Become, is part of our outreach. Our neighborhood Block Club has been re-energized. Additional projects in process are; Communicate with the neighborhood via newsletter & calendar, electronic sign, and message board. Also hold a Faith in Action Sundaycreating an inventory of assets and needs, and create an inviting external space, redesign entry way, and a community garden

IN OUR WORSHIP
